It is largely taken to be of little critical interest, as simply to be equated with heteronormativity. This seminar, by contrast, considers the term transgression in relation to heterosexuality and in particular to heterosex. This discussion leads to the question of what might transgression in the realm of the dominant look like, how might a transgressive heterosexuality be conceptualised?
